Beatrix Potter was born in 1866 in London. She wrote a lot of children's books about animals.

She had a brother called Bertram and they kept rabbits, mice and bats as pets. Beatrix also loved worms and snails.

Beatrix had a pet rabbit called Peter Piper. She wrote a story about him. The story was called 'The Tale of Peter Rabbit'.

Beatrix Potter lived in the Lake District in England. She had a farm there called Hill Top and she kept lots of sheep there.

Beatrix died in 1943 aged 77. When she died she gave her farm and sheep to the National Trust.

Helen Beatrix Potter was born on 28th July 1866 in South Kensington in London. She was the daughter of Rupert and Helen Potter. She was called by her middle name of Beatrix. Her brother Bertram was born when she was six years old.

Beatrix and Bertram created their own zoo in their house, their pets included rabbits, mice and bats. Beatrix's most famous pet was a rabbit called Peter Piper. She paid 4s 6d

for him (approx. £13 today), which she thought was very expensive! Beatrix made pets of the mice which lived in her room, they would come out from the floorboards when she called them and she gave each of them a name. She also loved worms and snails.

In 1893 Beatrix wrote a letter to Noel Moore, the son of her old governess Annie. He was unwell and she wanted to cheer him up, so she wrote him a story about her rabbit Peter. Annie suggested that the rabbit letter might make a good children's book, so Beatrix extended the story and drew some illustrations. She published it as 'The Tale of Peter Rabbit' in 1901.



Beatrix loved the Lake District and in 1905 she bought Hill Top Farm in Near Sawrey. The house provided the setting for some of the 24 children's books she wrote.

Beatrix was involved in the conservation of the Lake District and she worked with a group who became the National Trust. Beatrix died in 1943 aged 77. She left 14 farms, over 4 000 acres of land and lots of Herdwick sheep to the National Trust.

But Peter, who was very naughty, ran straight away to Mr McGregor's garden, and squeezed under the gate!





First he ate some lettuces and some French beans; and then he ate some radishes;

And then, feeling rather sick, he went to look for some parsley.

But round the end of a cucumber frame, whom should he meet but Mr McGregor!

Mr McGregor was on his hands and knees planting out young cabbages, but he jumped up and ran after Peter, waving a rake and calling out, 'Stop thief!'"


